FIRST WORD

n organized society is based on systems. It has systems for education, health, agriculture, work, sports, individuals, families; more or less for everything and everyone. Systems mean rules and regulations, proper materials, technology and people. Nature, too, runs on well defined systems.

Systems allow for smooth running, efficiency, achieving goals, joy and peace. Where there is a dearth of systems or there are wrong systems, chaos, conundrums and conflicts result. And, at the root of all systems lie individuals – people with knowledge, skills and values.

Social scientists believe that without values, a society would disintegrate. Religious leaders believe that without values and proper faith, human life becomes meaningless. The root cause of all ills is an overriding materialistic approach to life. Corruption, crime, promiscuity, disease and conflicts are the phenomena of a wholly materialistic attitude. We need to inculcate in our children, youths and society moral, cultural and spiritual values through a sound educational system, enlightened families and bona fide religious organizations.

Mahatma Gandhi writes, "The end of all knowledge must be building up of character." Education should not only make a student into an intellectual, but also help him become whole – meaning, one who practises truth (satya), compassion (daya), nonviolence (ahimsa), continence (brahmacharya), nonstealing (asteya) and non-possession (aparigraha). Education without values leads the individual towards immoral and nefarious activities. Such a person cannot differentiate between right and wrong or appreciate the importance of values. In addition to teaching analytical and critical skills, education should also equip students to cope adequately with the challenges and pitfalls of life. Thus, education is not only about academic excellence, but also about character-building, emotional growth and spiritual growth.

In 2010, India had 300 universities, 20,000 colleges, 260 central laboratories, and three million scientists² – the third largest scientific pool in the world. India also possesses a rich spiritual and cultural heritage that dates back 10,000 years. It is high time that our educational institutions teach India's glorious heritage to produce morally robust and spiritually proud citizens. Mahatma Gandhi emphasizes the importance of spiritual faith in life, "If the education you get turns you away from God, I do not know how it is going to help you and how you are going to help the world."³

Pramukh Swami Maharaj often says, "The heart of education is the education of the heart." The BAPS students' hostels in India and the satsang assemblies in BAPS mandirs worldwide are bastions of character-building, service to society and spiritual faith. The first BAPS students' hostel was built and inaugurated by Yogiji Maharaj in 1965, in Vidyanagar. Ever since, through the efforts of Pramukh Swami Maharaj and his sadhus, the students at the BAPS *chhatralayas* have been nurtured holistically. Today, thousands of *chhatralaya* alumni spread throughout the world live morally upright lives and offer their services to Satsang and the countries they live in.



WHY SHRI HARI INCARNATED ON EARTH?

Shri Hari took a bath by the Ganga Jaliya well and returned to his room, Akshar Ordi. At that time Laduba and Jivuba had sent milk garnished with almonds, pistachios, cardamom and saffron for Maharaj. They had also sent penda and barfi to eat. Shri Hari had his breakfast and went to Lakshmi Vadi.

Sachchidanand Swami had sent fresh brinjals for Maharaj. They were fried and spiced at Maharaj's behest and he ate them with rotla, makhan and milk for lunch. Then Maharaj served the fried brinjals to his sadhus, while others served generous helpings of rotla, makhan, and milk or buttermilk. Thereafter, Maharaj sat beneath an asopalav tree before an assembly of sadhus and devotees.

Shortly thereafter, Nath Bhakta of Vadodara arrived with a large group of devotees. Shri Hari expressed his pleasure and stood up to embrace Nath Bhakta. Maharaj asked him, "Have you got your accommodation for the night?" Nath Bhakta

replied, "Yes Maharaj, we have it in the darbar. On learning about your presence here, I have come for your darshan."

Shri Hari told the sadhus, "Make the dining arrangements for all of them." After having their meal, Nath Bhakta came to Maharaj and requested, "Maharaj we wish to perform pujan and offer clothes and ornaments as gifts."

Maharaj asked, "Is there any other wish you have?"

Nath Bhakta smiled with joy and revealed, "Yes Maharaj. After you don these clothes we wish to rock you on a swing." Maharaj responded happily, "I, too, wish to fulfil all the good wishes of my devotees. It is with this purpose that I have come from Akshardham to earth."

Nishkulanand Swami assured Nath Bhakta, "By the time you perform Maharaj's pujan and offer him gifts I'll make a hindolo." And Nishkulanand Swami set up a hindolo between the two tamarind trees in Lakshmi Vadi."

Nath Bhakta and the devotees from Vadodara performed Maharaj's pujan and offered him expensive clothes and ornaments. In response to their devotion, Shri Hari donned the clothes and sat on the hindolo. The devotees of Vadodara rocked Maharaj with exuberant devotion. The sadhus and other devotees also participated in the devotions. Shri Hari blessed all with the bliss of Akshardham.

GOD MAKES HIMSELF EASILY AVAILABLE

The next day, a spiritual assembly was in progress in Gadhada. Shri Hari was intently listening to a discourse on *Moksha Dharma* from the Mahabharat. Someone then intervened to inform him that Brahmanand Swami and his group of sadhus were not far from the outskirts of Gadhada. Immediately Shri Hari declared, "We should go and receive Swami and his group. Stop the *katha* and everyone get ready." Maharaj told Naja Jogiya to saddle his mare, Manki. Shri Hari and the Kathi Darbars mounted on their horses. All the sadhus got ready and started walking ahead.

Brahmanand Swami and his sadhus were coming from the road to Khopala. On seeing Shri Hari approaching to receive him, Brahmanand Swami felt a tide of emotion. He thought how loving Maharaj was and how easily accessible he had made himself. Swami knew that Maharaj showered all with his divine love and presence to foster their devotion and consolidate their satsang. Overwhelmed by Maharaj's love, tears trickled from Brahmanand Swami's eyes. By that time Maharaj had arrived before him.

Brahmanand Swami threw himself prostrate before Maharaj. Shri Hari raised him and embraced him. Then Maharaj embraced each of his sadhus and asked them about their wellbeing. The entourage returned to Dada's *darbar*. Shri Hari entered his room, Akshar Ordi, along with Brahmanand Swami, Muktanand Swami and Nityanand Swami.

Lunch was served to Maharaj. Thereafter, Shri Hari gave the entire dish of consecrated food to Brahmanand Swami and expressed his pleasure.

SHRI HARI HOLDS READINGS OF VARIOUS SHASTRAS

The Indian New Year in 1823 (A.S. 1879) had already set. Maharaj decided to listen to the readings of various shastras by Pragji Purani. Once the discourse on *Moksha Dharma* was over,

Maharaj told him to read the *Pancham Skand* (5th Canto) and *Dasham Skand* (10th Canto) of the Shrimad Bhagvat. Then, Maharaj listened to the Shrimad Bhagavad Gita and its commentary by Ramanujacharya. During the discourses Shri Hari sometimes explained the subtle meanings of the shastras and highlighted its essence.

Maharaj made Pragji Purani read the *Vasudev Mahatmya* from the Skand Puran, the Sama Veda, the *Mitakshara* commentary on *Yagnavalkya Smruti* by Vignaneshwar and the *Vidur Niti*.

In conclusion, Shri Hari advised, "The reason for reading the various shastras was to highlight the purpose of attaining liberation in this human birth. This essence, incorporated in all the shastras, can only be culled out and explained fully by God or his realized Sadhu. Other than that by merely listening to the shastras one's intellect becomes confused. Thus, by understanding this essence and imbibing it in one's life you will attain ultimate *moksha* through my association. If, however, someone fails to understand the scriptural essence, but has faith in my form and words, he will still attain *moksha*.

Shri Hari celebrated the festivals of Janmashtami, Jal Jhilani, Sharad Punam, Annakut and Prabodhini Ekadashi at Gadhada. On Makar Sankranti day, Hirjibhai, a leading devotee of Bhuj, arrived. Maharaj asked him, "How far has the mandir construction work reached in Bhuj?" Hirjibhai replied, "In the next three to four months, the mandir will be ready enough to perform the *pratishtha* rituals. The devotees of Bhuj wish that the *pratishtha* be done soon so that they can have your darshan."

Shri Hari assured, "Once you reach back, let me know about it and I will schedule the *pratishtha* for the month of Vaishakh (April-May)." With Shri Hari's blessings Hirjibhai felt a surge of confidence that the mandir in Bhuj would be ready by Vaishakh.

FESTIVAL OF VASANT IN VARTAL

Shri Hari arrived in Vartal and celebrated the Vasant festival. He sprayed coloured water on the sadhus and devotees and blessed them. Thereafter, everyone joined in the mandir construction *seva*. Shri Hari was happy to see all engaged in the mandir *seva* for the perpetuation of *upasana*. He felt that the true fulfilment of a human birth was to engage one self in such *seva*.

At that time Takha Pagi of Bamnoli asked Shri Hari to sanctify his village. Shri Hari travelled from Vartal to Bamnoli. There, too, he sprayed coloured water on all. Then Takha Pagi took the water in which Maharaj had bathed and added it to the village well. Shri Hari smiled and added, "Pagi, from today your well has become holy like the Ganga." Shri Hari then travelled to the nearby village of Mahudiya and later returned to Vartal. After staying there for a few days he returned to Gadhada.

GIVES THE MURTIS OF RADHA-KRISHNA TO THE DEVOTEES OF MULI

Two devotees from Muli, Amabhai Parmar and Jethabhai, arrived in Gadhada. After having Maharaj's darshan and listening to his discourses they requested Shri Hari, "Give us the *murtis* of Radha-Krishna which you worship and offer *thal* daily. Then, whenever you come to Muli, you can ritually install the *murtis* for the growth of satsang there."

Shri Hari accepted their request and gave them the two *murtis*. Then he assured, "When I go to Panchala I shall come to Muli to perform the *pratishtha*."

Shri Hari wished to celebrate the Fuldol festival in Panchala. So, he left Gadhada one early morning with a large retinue of sadhus, *parshads* and devotees.

BE BRAVE IN ABIDING BY NIYAMS

Shri Hari passed through Pipardi and stayed the night at Hathasani. He left in the evening and travelled all night to reach Jasdan in the morning. The Darbar of Jasdan, Chela Khachar, welcomed Maharaj and humbly requested, "Maharaj, you are my father's guru. I'm indeed blessed by your arrival. I request that you and everyone accompanying you take lunch here before you depart."


Shri Hari explained, "It is past early morning and to stay back till lunchtime will delay our travel schedule. I wish to leave right now." On hearing this Chela Khachar became disappointed. Maharaj told him, "Bapu, there is no need to be saddened. Give us whatever food you have ready. We will have it during the journey." Thus, Chela Khachar brought barfi and penda in profusion. Then Maharaj asked him, "Do you follow the moral disciplines properly?" On hearing this Chela Khachar turned silent. His dull countenance belied his paltry allegiance to satsang niyams. He mustered some strength and confessed, "Maharaj, I follow only two niyams – abstinence from drinking liquor and stealing. The other niyams of not eating meat and committing adultery I don't follow." Then he passionately added, "I believe my moksha lies in having your association. I ask you to never forsake me."

Shri Hari clarified, "You seek *moksha* merely through divine association, regardless of observing *niyams*. Yet, if you truly understand the glory of association you would not relax in observing *niyams*. You are a Rajput by class and just as you would never retreat in war, braving all assaults, similarly you should be headstrong in following all the *niyams*."

Chela Khachar simply listened, feeling deficient in measuring up to the high moral standards Maharaj expected. Shri Hari continued, "Bapu, by having supreme faith in me and my Sadhu you will be liberated, but you'll have to start following the other two *niyams*."

Chela Khachar eventually nodded with commitment, "Okay Maharaj. I shall do as per your bidding."

ADHYĀY 3

Karmayoga – The Art of Karma

Part 18

(Recap: We previously looked at the first and second adhyāyas of the Gitā.

The first adhyāy extensively describes the grief of Arjuna. In the second adhyāy,

Shri Krishna first gives Arjuna words of courage, followed by the knowledge of sānkhya and
thereafter commenced the precepts on yoga. During the exposition of yoga,

Arjuna enquired about the qualities of a sthitapragna person, which Shri Krishna
then explained. In this article we will begin to look at the third adhyāy.)

To learn to live, is to learn to do. When education or training is added to those actions, they become a skill or art. We certainly do things, but the question is of skill. For example, if someone who does not know how to swim jumps into water and frantically waves his hands and feet, he still begins to drown, tire, get fed up and become miserable. He then says that he never wants to try swimming again. When that same person learns the art of swimming, he does not drown, tire, get fed up or become miserable. On the contrary, he enjoys swimming, and says that he wants to swim again. What at first caused misery, becomes a pleasure. This is the miracle of adding skill to actions. Shri Krishna has used the word kaushal for skill. With the words, 'योग: कर्मसु कौशलम्' – 'Yogaha karmasu kaushalam' - he has given karmas done with skill the calibre of yoga.

In the third *adhyāy*, Shri Krishna has given precepts on karmayoga. If we do karmas, we indeed become bound, but our shastras also teach us that if karmas attain the status of yoga, they

no longer bind; on the contrary, they liberate and give peace. The third *adhyāy* of the Gitā contains the secret of elevating karmas to the status of yoga. Let us imbibe that.

THE DOMINION OF KARMA

"न हि कश्चित् क्षणमि जातु तिष्ठत्यकर्मकृत्। कार्यते ह्यवशः कर्म सर्वः प्रकृतिजैर्गुणैः॥"

"Na hi kashchit kshanamapi jātu tishthatyakarmakrut, kāryate hyavashaha karma sarvaha prakrutijairgunaihi." "No one can pass even a moment without doing some sort of karma. Bound by their nature, everyone is compelled to do karmas" (Gitā 3.5).

This is an introduction to the domain of karma. We will notice the spread of this domain when we look around. All living things are continuously doing something or other: walking, sitting, looking, pondering, reading, eating and so on. Look at the circle of life too: a child is born, grows up, gets old, dies – then gets one life after the other. Thus, the stream of karmas continues ceaselessly. This

is not only amongst humans, this realm is seen to be spread across birds and animals alike; they are all constantly doing something. Karmas can be seen even in plants: buds develop on a stem, blossom into flowers and wither; fruits grow on trees, ripen and fall.

In the entire universe there is always some kind of process taking place. New occurrences are continuously taking place. Stars are born and die. Galaxies form and dissolve. The Sun constantly emits solar flares. The Earth constantly rotates. The cycle of high and low tides continues ceaselessly in the oceans. The seasons continually come and go.

The cycle of creation, sustenance and destruction can be seen to be spread everywhere. It is as if life is an ocean of karmas. Shri Krishna intends to explain here that life can never be found without karmas.

The words 'कार्यते ह्यवश: कर्म' - 'Kāryate hyavashaha karma' - show the dominance of karma. There is no living person who is doing nothing. Sometimes we may think that when we feel lazy we are doing nothing, but that is not completely true, we are always doing something. The wise define laziness as not doing what is meant to be done and doing what is not meant to be done. There is a big question in the world today regarding those without work. Those not working think they are doing nothing, but is that really true? The saying 'an idle mind is the devil's workshop' seems to be more true, and there are certainly a lot of things going on in the devil's workshop. Many a time, we are not lazy or free, but we are in some sort of thoughtless state; thoughtlessness regarding what to do. In this state, we lack the discrimination of what to do and what not to do. For example, when we are overcome by anger, if things do not happen the way we want, we then become thoughtless, and due to a lack of discrimination, we do the inappropriate. These are all karmas that occur under the influence of our innate nature.

The influence of karmas extends to well-read

scholars too. Shri Krishna says, "सदृशं चेष्टते स्वस्याः प्रकृतेर्ज्ञानवानि। प्रकृतिं यान्ति भूतानि निग्रहः किं करिष्यति॥" – "Sadrusham cheshtate svasyāhā prakrutergnā-navānapi, prakrutim yānti bhootāni nigrahaha kim karishyati." – "Even a person possessing jnān behaves according to his nature. All living things follow their nature, thus how can they abide by the restraints laid down by the shastras" (Gitā 3.33).

In this manner, Shri Krishna has clarified that the influence of karmas spreads over the whole world. Bhagwan Sawminarayan also references this *shloka* in the Vachanamrut explaining that even the *jnāni* are compelled by karmas (Vachanāmrut Gadhadā I 37).

Moreover, by pronouncing this extensive realm of karmas, Shri Krishna is hinting something to Arjuna. The story is as follows: In the previous adhyāy, Shri Krishna had belittled karmas, and Arjuna had kept the statement in mind, for it was exactly what he wanted. Arjuna was determined not to fight, and here he had found an appropriate excuse. Therefore, he told Shri Krishna, "O Krishna, if you consider karmas to be inferior, why are you telling me to take part in this terrible karma of battle? Are you trying to confuse me, or what?" (Gitā 3.1-2). Shri Krishna understood what was going on in Arjuna's mind. In reality, Shri Krishna's statement that Arjuna was using to argue his point of not going to war, had never been said in that way at all. Shri Krishna had called karmas not associated with Paramatma inferior. Nevertheless, rather than discussing that, Shri Krishna explains the extent of the reach of karmas saying, "No one can spend even a moment without doing some karma or other", and thus does not promote Arjuna's inclination to escape. To defend his decision not to do one particular karma, Arjuna has taken the extreme stance that no karmas should be done at all, and that too, trying to use the words of Shri Krishna! But Shri Krishna very clearly presents the above truth regarding karmas in a way that Arjuna understands it. Hearing this, Arjuna does indeed realize his mistake, and we will see this later in Arjuna's own words. If one is compelled to do karmas by one's innate nature, then it would of course be better to do karmas according the command of Bhagwan and attain peace and happiness – this is the principle that is being explained here.

DO AS HAS BEEN ASSIGNED

With regards to karma, Shri Krishna explains another point: "नियतं कुरु कर्म त्वं कर्म ज्यायो ह्यकर्मणः। शरीरयात्राऽपि च ते न प्रसिद्ध्येदकर्मणः॥" – "Niyatam kuru karma tvam karma jyāyo hyakarmanaha, shareerayātrā'pi cha te na prasiddhyedakarmanaha." – "O Arjuna! Do what you have been assigned to do, it is better to do than not to do. Moreover, if you completely forsake karmas, you will not be able to sustain life" (Gitā 3.8).

Let us understand this *shloka* in three parts. The first topic is that of diligence, presented with the words, 'कर्म ज्यायो ह्यकर्मणः' - 'Karma jyāyo hyakarmanaha' - 'It is better to do than not to do'. Do not remain free, continue to work. This was a command to shake off idleness, and an inspiration to wed effort. Indeed, if care is not taken, karmas can be harmful, but to completely forsake them for that reason is not acceptable to Shri Krishna by any means. Doing nothing has been shunned as much as doing bad things. Nothing can be achieved by lying around. Bhagwan Swaminarayan has also shown dislike to idleness saying, "If he is very lazy, sleeps too much and when told by others to bathe, meditate or observe other niyams, says, 'I'll do it later; what's the hurry? I'll do them slowly' then even though he may appear to be good, one should avoid his company" (Vachanāmrut Loyā 6). In the Mahābhārat, such laziness has been called negligence. Bhagwan Swaminarayan has pointed it out to be a great enemy on the spiritual path (Vachanāmrut Sārangpur 14).

The second point is that of sustaining life. One who forsakes karmas, dies. If one wants to live, karmas have to be done. God has made our bodies such that we have to do karmas to sustain them. This principle applies to humans, animals and birds alike. The only difference is that birds and animals never have to be told to do karmas. You will never find a bird asleep at sunrise. In fact, it is worth learning the virtue of hard work from them. Where there is laziness, illness finds a home; then to merely live is distressing. Brahmaswarup Yogiji Maharaj used to narrate the following parable: There was once a mendicant. He lived in the jungle. On the auspicious day of akhātrij, a merchant desired to take him to his house for a meal. The merchant approached the mendicant and requested him to come to his home. "As God wishes," was the mendicant's reply. The merchant brought a horse-carriage to chauffeur the mendicant back to his house and said, "Please take a seat in this vehicle and come to my house to eat."

"As God wishes." Was all that the mendicant replied again. The merchant realized that the mendicant said nothing else but this, but would come for the meal. He then lifted the mendicant and sat him in the carriage. Soon, his home came, the merchant said, "My house has come, you may now alight from the carriage."

"As God wishes," came the reply again.

The merchant lifted the mendicant from the carriage and put him on the ground and said, "You may have a bath."

"As God wishes," said the mendicant.

The merchant bathed him and said, "Wear your clothes."

"As God wishes," continued the mendicant.

The merchant dressed him and after offering the thirty-two types of delicacies to God, he prepared a seat for the mendicant and requested him to take his place.

"As God wishes," came the reply.

The merchant sat him on his seat and said, "You may eat now."

"As God wishes."

The merchant put a morsel of food in the mendicant's mouth and said, "Now you may chew."

"As God wishes."

The merchant then brought a stick and said, "I have done this much. I cannot shove the morsel into your stomach with a rod; you will have to chew it yourself.'

Only the indolent use principles such as 'As God wishes' in such an inferior manner. It is compulsory for someone who wants to live to do karmas. The Gitā advises us to refrain from such indolence.

The third point is of doing that which has been assigned. This is of more importance. Although there has been stress on doing karmas rather than not doing karmas, there is also clarification that those karmas should be as assigned. It is better to do something rather than nothing, but this does not mean doing useless or unfitting karmas, thinking, 'Do anything you wish, just do not remain idle.' The emphasis is on doing what has been assigned, i.e. do karmas according to rules, responsibilities and duties. Everyone in this world has a responsibility, everyone has a duty. This is what is meant by 'niyat karma'. Our shastras give us a clear and comprehensive description on these, and for this reason they also serve the role of being dharmashastras. If we truly fulfil the duties imparted to us in the shastras, then both we and the world at large will become happy; and the whole world would be a place of peace and harmony. We should remember the fact that our every deed affects us, our family and the entire human race. We are a part of creation, each action is a component of creation. The greater the quality of our actions, the greater the progress of all; and the poorer the quality, the further the diminishment of all. Therefore, for the betterment of society, Pujya Pramukh Swami Maharaj often says to the sadhus, devotees and volunteers, "Each person should do whatever has been assigned to them properly, then you and all will attain happiness. Bhagwan Swaminarayan, Yogiji Maharaj and Shastriji Maharaj will be pleased on you; everyone will be pleased." Assigned work implies responsibility; responsibility means 'niyat karma'. These deeds can please us, our guru, Bhagwan and all - this is the message Pramukh

Swami gives to establish the karmayoga of the Gitā in our day-to-day lives.

Bhagwan Swaminarayan uses the word 'agna' for these 'niyat karma'; doing them is our duty. He says, "Only one who follows the commands of the Satpurush can be said to be under the influence of favourable circumstances. To deviate from those commands is the very definition of adverse circumstances" (Vachanāmrut Gadhadā II 51). He has also described agnā as being of two types - do's and dont's. He says, "The prescribed moral do's and don'ts are indeed true, not false. Whosoever falsifies them will be consigned to narak" (Vachanāmrut Gadhadā I 42). Informing us that abstaining from our responsibilities is a grave sin, Bhagwan Swaminarayan inspires us to do what has been assigned to us. Only if we refrain from doing what we are not meant to do, can we properly do what we are meant to do; thus, following both do's and dont's is our responsibility.

There are many energetic people, but only actions in the above manner give true and good outcomes. Some say, "I don't like to sit around doing nothing," and they spend their time exercising excessively, or aimlessly wandering around the shops, or watching and listening to unnecessary things, and they believe this to be their liveliness. But the Gitā does not promote this anywhere. Directing us to 'niyat karma' the Gita, in a way, shuns the possibility of free time. Many things such as thinking good thoughts, serving, helping others, devotion, etc. are our duty, our responsibility, our 'niyat karma'; but when we do such things we do not feel as if we have done something, therefore some people incorrectly think that such things are done by those who are free.

In this manner, rather than doing useless things, things that are harmful to oneself or others, or things that we have decided for ourselves, the emphasis is on the 'niyat' actions that we must all do.

Thus, in this *shloka*, the Gitā diverts us from inactivity and directs us on to the path of '*niyat karma*'.

EMANCIPATION AND WELFARE BY KARMA

Giving the example of established people in society, Shri Krishna explains the necessity of doing karmas, saying, "कर्मणैव हि संसिद्धिमास्थिता जनकादयः। लोकसंग्रहमेवाऽपि संपश्यन् कर्तुमर्हसि॥" – "Karmanaiva hi sansiddhimāsthitā janakādayaha, lokasangrahamevā'pi sampashyan kartumarhasi." – "O Arjuna! Even kings like Janak attained fulfilment by abiding by karmayoga. Moreover, keeping the welfare of society in mind too, you should do karmas" (Gitā 3.20).

The welfare of society means to promote a sense of duty. If everyone in society properly fulfilled their duty, then the world would benefit. Even great kings, like Janak, properly abided by their duties and bettered society. They had made arrangements for the people. Not only that, they were skilled in the art of fulfilling the responsibilities of a king, therefore they attained the ultimate goal. Furthermore, he tells Arjuna, "You, too, are such a great king, and you, too, should do what has been assigned to you and protect society and attain that ultimate goal."

Shri Krishna also substantiates the reason for insisting that Arjuna do his duty, saying, "यद् यदाचरति श्रेष्ठस्तत्तदेवेतरो जनः। स यत्प्रमाणं कुरुते लोकस्तदनुवर्तते॥" – "Yad yadācharati shreshthastattadevetaro janaha, sa yatpramānam kurute lokastadanuvartate." – "O Arjuna, whatever the great do, the rest follow. That which the great authenticate (by doing), the rest accordingly do" (Gitā 3.21).

Here 'great' refers to the icons of society, the ideal. Everyone has an idol in their minds,

whether consciously or subconsciously. Each of our actions is influenced by something seen, heard or believed. When we see, hear or come into contact with someone in any way, their actions begin to influence us. If that person becomes the idol of our lives, the influence occurs quicker and to a greater extent. As a result, our actions begin to imitate those of our idols. The influence of the actions of political leaders, actors, singers, musicians, and other talented people that people have accepted as their idols can be seen on those very people.

Our idols should be ideal, i.e. only the best should be idols. Many learn from them. Arjuna was also one of the best, he was the idol of many and, here, Shri Krishna is reminding him of that. If Arjuna's ideas were faulty, then believing those faulty ideas to be ideal, people would follow them. If this happens, society, too, would become faulty. If a watch breaks, an individual is troubled, if a clock on the wall in a home breaks then a family is troubled, but if the clock tower of the town breaks then the whole town is misled. Everyone's eyes were on Arjuna. If there was some fault in his understanding, then this would cause trouble to many. With this vision in mind, Shri Krishna understandingly inspires Arjuna to do the karmas that he must.


Thus, in the third *adhyāy*, Shri Krishna reveals the art of doing karmas. We have contemplated a little on this in this article. In the next article, we will consider matters such as what is karmayoga in its true sense? What are the means of karmayoga? And more...

Yogiji Maharaj and Youths

Setting the Template



In the early 1960s, when Yogiji Maharaj visited Vallabh Vidyanagar, its founder, Bhailalbhai Dyabhai Patel, told him, "Swami, we have set up big complexes to educate youths, but arrangements to instil good values and character in them are lacking."

For many years, wherever he travelled, Yogiji Maharaj had been inspiring children and youths to lead a morally upright, spiritual life. He had established the *bal* and *yuvak mandals* to ensure that these ideals were transmitted to as many youths as possible.

Furthering the scope of this endeavour, Yogiji Maharaj realized the need to focus also on the youths studying in college and ensure that they, too, were taught *brahmavidya* – spiritual knowledge.

Yogiji Maharaj envisioned that BAPS *chhatralayas* would enable this. Shri Ambalal Karsandas Patel, grandson of Keshavlal Pragji Patel – a leading

devotee of Shastriji Maharaj, had donated a prime plot of land (1½ *vighas*) on the Anand-Vidyanagar Road to the BAPS Swaminarayan Sanstha. It was there that Yogiji Maharaj wished to build a *chhatralaya*. Yogiji Maharaj often referred to the *chhatralaya* as a 'boarding house'.

So, on 27 April 1964, Yogiji Maharaj joyfully performed the groundbreaking ceremony there, in the presence of Shri Bhailalbhai Patel, Shri Ishwarbhai Patel (university vice-chancellor) and other leading educationists.

To prepare for this occasion, 500 yuvaks from 16 yuvak mandals served day and night for a week to dig the chhatralaya foundations. Together with their seva, they also benefitted from Yogiji Maharaj's discourses and earned his blessings. Yogiji Maharaj himself joined in the strenuous seva by lifting around 300 tagaras (tubs) of soil.

He encouraged the youths by guaranteeing, "Each *tagaro* lifted will earn the merit of one *yagna*. If you lift even one, you will attain Akshardham."

Within one year the *chhatralaya* was built. Yogiji Maharaj named it the 'Akshar-Purushottam Chhatralaya', and the inauguration event was held on 20 June 1965 in the presence of Pramukh Swami Maharaj and Manibhai Jivabhai Patel.

The opening of this *chhatralaya* marked the beginning of the BAPS Swaminarayan Sanstha's educational activities.

In the first year, 50 students were admitted to the *chhatralaya*. Some of them were so mischievous that the rector became extremely frustrated and pondered whether it would be better to close it down and rent out the rooms instead. He presented the proposal to Yogiji Maharaj

on 25 January 1966, during his visit to Vallabh Vidyanagar. However, Yogiji Maharaj encouraged him, "There is no need to be frustrated about this. I will explain to them all."

Later that day, Yogiji Maharaj held an assembly of all the *chhatralaya* youths and then met each of them individually. Such was Yogiji Maharaj's affection for them that the youths agreed to give up their rowdy ways and bad habits.

Yogiji Maharaj knew that, directed properly, the youths would channel their energy and talent into positive, productive activities. Yogiji Maharaj's love for the youths had won them over.

Yogiji Maharaj's vision was clear: it was absolutely essential that to teach good values to the youths, faith in God was necessary. So, to nourish their faith, Yogiji Maharaj inaugurated a prayer hall on 7 August 1967, and established a daily routine of prayers which all the youths attended.

Yogiji Maharaj also nurtured the self-confidence latent in the youths.

Once, Yogiji Maharaj was in Bochasan for the Guru Purnima festival. At around midnight, about 60 youths from the *chhatralaya* arrived there. Yogiji Maharaj was delighted to see them and greeted them warmly and affectionately. Then, out of the blue, he instructed them all, "Everyone must observe a fast tomorrow. It is Guru Purnima. There is great merit in observing a *nirjala* fast!"

And the youths enthusiastically accepted his wish. Thereafter, Yogiji Maharaj repeatedly encouraged youths to fast to develop self-control and mental discipline.

Later that year, on 7 November 1968, Yogiji Maharaj was in the small village of Gana, near Bochasan. At about 8.00 p.m., youths from Vidyanagar came for his darshan. Yogiji Maharaj was overjoyed to see them and asked, "Which of you will observe a fast tomorrow? Eleven of you must volunteer." Then, he himself noted the names of the 11 youths and blessed each of them with his characteristic pat on the back, "Here, I give you two kilos of strength!"

Yogiji Maharaj added, "I have given you this fast out of love and to express my pleasure. But, whether I am near or far, you must all observe a fast on *ekadashi*."

The students readily accepted Swamishri's wish. By and by, through observing austerities and doing *seva*, the discipline and self-confidence of the youths continued to increase.

Yogiji Maharaj also encouraged them to read and speak in English.


On 20 September 1967, Yogiji Maharaj was at the *chhatralaya* in Vallabh Vidyanagar. The youths had prepared a handwritten magazine titled 'Jnandeep'. Yogiji Maharaj was immensely pleased by their efforts and blessed them. Then, during the conversation, the English book, *Life and Philosophy of Shri Swaminarayan*, written by Harshadbhai Dave, was mentioned. To this, Yogiji Maharaj said, "All collegians should read this book." He then autographed each of the 30 books bought by the students.

Yogiji Maharaj also frequently reinforced higher spiritual messages and principles among the youths. He explained, "When one accepts God as one's only saviour, then one is said to have firm conviction. So, engage in satsang for one's *kalyan*. In Loya 12, Maharaj talks about the highest level of conviction. If this is attained, then one is liberated. I want to make you all like that. I want to grant you all the state of *aksharrup*."

Sometimes, when Yogiji Maharaj was at the *chhatralaya*, he would pay a surprise visit to the youths' rooms.

On 17 November 1967, Kiritbhai (presently Akshaymuni Swami) and Baldevsinh (presently Yagnapriya Swami) and other youths arranged Yogiji Maharaj's *padhramanis* to each room. As the occupant of the first room was not yet ready, Yogiji Maharaj began in reverse order, from room 30. Rajendra, who was not a *satsangi*, lived in that room. When Yogiji Maharaj entered, he was performing his usual daily puja – using the *murtis* of many devas and devis. He was worried

about what Yogiji Maharaj would say to him on seeing the large number of *murtis*. To his surprise, Yogiji Maharaj remarked, "Oh! You have given us the darshan of many devas," and then devoutly bowed down to them. Rajendra (presently Narendraprasad Swami) was deeply moved by Yogiji Maharaj's purity and love.

The youths continually felt Yogiji Maharaj's motherly love. He would instruct them to fast, but would also personally arrange for and serve them food for *parna*. He frequently sent sweet delicacies and other items for the youths to eat.

In July 1969, Yogiji Maharaj was in Bochasan for the Guru Purnima celebration. Thakorji had been offered a meal of *dudhpak* and *malpuva*. Seeing this, Yogiji Maharaj remembered the youths of Vidyanagar *chhatralaya*. He had stacks of fresh *malpuva* and containers of *dudhpak* packed for them and sent the food with Motibhai. The youths were overwhelmed by such motherly affection.

Yogiji Maharaj had a special way of engaging the *chhatralaya* youths in *seva*. On one occasion, he told the youths that in his dream he had cleaned the garbage bins in the mandir and Shastriji Maharaj was delighted.

They asked him, "Bapa, today should we clear the garbage." Yogiji Maharaj expressed his utmost delight. And so, these intelligent, educated youngsters got to work.

Many were amazed to see the love the youths had for an aging sadhu. This is, indeed, the special feature of the 'Brahmavidya College' established by Yogiji Maharaj.

The lives of these youths had become enriched with many virtues. This was the outcome of Yogiji Maharaj's vision.

On 12 May 1967, Yogiji Maharaj wrote to the rector, Shri Tribhovanbhai Patel, "Many blessings... the [brahmavidya] college will become full. The chhatralaya will become renowned. Blessings that the youths develop good character."

Today, the BAPS manages many *chhatra-layas*, each furthering the selfless vision of Yogiji Maharaj.

Elaborating on the words of Yogiji Maharaj that "Many 'living' mandirs will be prepared here", Pramukh Swami Maharaj says, "This *chhatralaya* is not merely made of walls and ceilings, but it is a source of 'living' mandirs."

Continuing the work of Yogiji Maharaj, Pramukh Swami Maharaj has enthusiastically and admirably expanded upon Yogiji Maharaj's vision to provide value-based education to youths.

Milestones of 50 Years of

BAPS Chhatralayas and Schools



Akshar-Purushottam Chhatralaya, Vidyanagar

n 1954, Yogiji Maharaj was travelling by train near Anand. On seeing Vinubhai's (Pujya Mahant Swami) Agriculture College, Yogiji declared that he would like to establish a College of Brahmavidya opposite it.

Soon thereafter, a stalwart devotee of Anand, Shri Ambalalbhai Patel (popularly known as Kalyan Yojna), donated his land for the construction of the students hostel (*chhatralaya*). In 1964, Yogiji Maharaj performed the foundation-stone laying ceremony for the *chhatralaya*. Then with the efforts of youths, a building for the Akshar-Purushottam Chhatralaya (APC) was completed in one year. On 20 June 1965, Yogiji Maharaj and Pramukh Swami Maharaj inaugurated the APC.

The *chhatralaya* would provide a conducive environment to students for their academic studies and in also inspiring moral and spiritual values in their lives. The APC became the starting point of BAPS education services to society. At that time no one had thought that the APC would become the cradle of many more *chhatralayas*.

Through the Herculean efforts of Pramukh Swami Maharaj the seed of BAPS educational activities flourished into a giant banyan tree.

At the inception of the APC in Vallabh Vidyanagar there were only 20 rooms. However in 1971, with the growing number of students wanting to stay at the chhatralaya, Pramukh Swami Maharaj inspired the construction of another floor on the existing building and added 40 more rooms. In spite of this the chhatralaya was still not big enough to accommodate the burgeoning number of students. Thus, in 1984, two more building blocks were built on the chhatralaya grounds. In 1993, a large prayer and assembly hall was constructed and Swamishri performed the pratishtha of the murtis of Shri Akshar-Purushottam Maharaj and the Guru Parampara. By then the chhatralaya in Vidyanagar provided accommodations for 500 students.

The need for more *chhatralayas* in different towns and cities was observed by Pramukh Swami Maharaj. Thus, Swamishri decided to build more *chhatralayas* to provide a conducive atmosphere for education, and inspire values and personality development in the students. In the mornings and evenings, daily satsang assemblies inculcate

self-control, devotion and values in them. To develop their personality debates on current topics, quizzes, question-answer sessions on spirituality, speeches, inspiring dramas and skits, music concerts and traditional dance training, celebration of festivals and study circles are organized on a regular basis.

Swamishri has also inspired students to perform social and moral services in society, like anti-addiction campaigns, cleanliness drives and relief work in times of calamity. The youth's fervently participate in these programmes to please Swamishri.

During his visits to the *chhatralayas* Swamishri has always made personal efforts in maintaining the quality of accommodations, food and cleanliness. He has also taken special care in making all


the chhatralayas clean and homely.

Furthermore, through the donations by BAPS, several institutes have been established in Gujarat: Pramukh Swami Medical College, Karamsad; Pramukh Swami Institute of Electronics (Vidyanagar); School of Architecture (Vidyanagar); Pramukh Swami Science College (Kadi) and Pramukh Swami Planetarium (Rajkot) and several Secondary and Higher Secondary schools. For the underprivileged the BAPS has sponsored 15 new schools in Maharashtra, Orissa, Arunachal Pradesh, Assam and Tripura.

During the 50 years (1965-2015) of BAPS's educational activities Swamishri has made giant efforts for its flourishment and prestige. The milestone events of that astonishing journey is covered in this article.

VALLABH VIDYANAGAR

In 1965, the BAPS educational activities was auspiciously launched in Vallabh Vidyanagar by Yogiji Maharaj and Pramukh Swami Maharaj. Thereafter, through the intense efforts of Pramukh Swami Maharaj the APC has grown to accommodate 500 students today. Here, students studying in the 11th and 12th standards, engineering, architecture, arts and commerce are motivated to study well and inspired with values. The fascinating saga of BAPS educational activities begins from the Akshar-Purushottam Chhatralaya in Vidyanagar...

Unique Centres for Spiritual Enrichment

e want to build a college of *brahmavidya* here... Living mandirs will be nurtured here." With such a vision, Yogiji Maharaj inaugurated the first BAPS Swaminarayan Chhatralaya in Vallabh Vidyanagar in 1965. He was committed to developing excellent centres of education that would enable the all-round development of students.

This vision of Yogiji Maharaj has been furthered by the enormous efforts of Pramukh Swami Maharaj. Today, under the auspices of the BAPS' educational services, many educational centres provide thousands of students the opportunity of attaining academic excellence and developing a virtuous life.

From early morning to late night, all these centres are abuzz with student-centric activities. Through a planned daily schedule and a variety of creative

programmes, moral, cultural, spiritual and professional values are nurtured in the youths.

The following is a brief overview.

A CHHATRALAYA MORNING

From early morning, BAPS Swaminarayan Chhatralayas pulsate with a variety of activities.

Daily, after rising and washing, students join in the morning prayers. They collectively sing profound prayers composed by the great sadhus of Bhagwan Swaminarayan. The resonance of these prayers creates a vibrant spiritual ambience. Then, after the students have sung the *arti* and *ashtaks*, experienced sadhus deliver a short discourse. Thereafter, groups of students, as per the weekly rota, perform their personal daily puja together in the prayer hall.

Then, on Sundays or holidays, students enthusiastically engage in physical *seva* in various parts of the *chhatralaya*.

After completing other personal tasks, students take lunch by 10.30 a.m. and then go to college.

On returning in the late afternoon, students play sports and participate in other physical activities. They also relax by engaging in light discussions with the sadhus.

After evening prayers and meditation in the mandir, the students attend the *arti*. This is followed by a short discourse by experienced sadhus that provides spiritual and moral inspiration.

After dinner, students are required to study from 8 to 10 p.m. Thereafter, some students join the sadhus in the nightly singing of the *cheshta*. After 10.30, they again engage in further studies.

The special feature of the *chhatralaya* is that the students themselves organize and manage the various daily activities. For this there is a working committee of 35 to 40 students, who are assigned responsibilities for these activities. These activities include assembly arrangements, audio cabin, dining arrangements, maintenance, library and others.

In addition, students also organize and participate in special events.

BIRTHDAY CELEBRATIONS

Throughout the year, the birthdays of Bhagwan Swaminarayan and the guru *parampara* are celebrated with great devotion and special assemblies. From three to seven days preceding the birthday, a series of activities and events are held to pay tribute to these great personalities. These

include dramas, skits, dances, mimes, speeches, singing kirtans and others. Through such participation, youths develop in a multitude of ways. Sometimes the celebrations incorporate pilgrimages by foot and while doing *dandvats*, and *pradakshinas*. Youths also undertake observances such as fasting, not gossiping about or slandering others, contemplating on incidents from the life of Pramukh Swami Maharaj, etc.

Students post quotations and short incidents from the lives of Bhagwan Swaminarayan and the guru *parampara*.

The sadhus support their efforts and contribute by delivering speeches.

Thus, during these celebration periods, the *chhatralaya* is abuzz with great devotion.

JNANSATRA

Every year a two-day jnansatra is held in

which learned and experienced sadhus discourse and guide on various topics. The students also benefit through question-answer sessions and discussions.

AUSTERITIES

Austerities help to discipline the mind and body. So, most students observe a fast on every *ekadashi*. On *ekadashis*, students sing bhajans in the evening before the *murtis* in the mandir.

During the holy month of Shravan, while regularly attending college, students observe various forms of fasting, as per their choice: *dharna-parna*, drinking only liquids, *ektana*, *chandrayan* and others. For years Pramukh Swami Maharaj has expressed his delight at the students' austerities by blessing and serving them when their fasts ended. Now, the students conclude their fasts at the hands of senior sadhus.

DIWALI-ANNAKUT

Some students stay behind at the *chhatralaya* during their Diwali holidays from college. They help in cleaning the campus, designing *rangolis*, arranging the *annakut* before *murtis* and in many other ways.

SATSANG EXAMINATIONS

Students diligently prepare for and sit in the annual Satsang Examinations, which help to

LOCAL ASSEMBLIES

Students from many BAPS *chhatralayas* regularly visit the city suburbs, and nearby villages and towns to conduct satsang assemblies. The students themselves deliver speeches and sing bhajans.

SPECIAL CELEBRATIONS

Also, eclipses are celebrated as stated in the shastras.

The sadhus, through their daily discourses to and discussions with the students guide them on academic and personal progress.



Inspiring Stories of BAPS Chhatralaya Students



During their stay at the BAPS Swaminarayan Chhatralayas, students learn to excel in academics, become more organized and disciplined, and are inspired with values and faith in God. They also gain self-confidence and learn to serve others through various activities in the chhatralaya and services to society. The following are stories of a few students reflecting the benefits they attained through their stay at the BAPS Swaminarayan Chhatralayas.

INSPIRED IN STUDIES AND SATSANG Mahendra Bharatbhai Patel BAPS Chhatralaya, Surat

I, Mahendra Bharatbhai Patel, was born and raised in Sadgavan village in the district of Tapi. It is a remote village on the border of Gujarat and Maharashtra, untouched by modernity. The entire vicinity was known as a tribal and underdeveloped area.

I was one of the many ignorant teenagers in the village.

On 10 July 1991, a man from my village brought me to Surat. He lived near Olpad, working in a local factory. He had brought me so that I could work

and study.

For me, Surat was a different world. It was the first time I had sat in a train, and seen so many people and so much traffic. The big houses and wide roads were also a new experience for me. I was overawed by it all and desperate to return to my peaceful village. Further, I am handicapped in my right leg and that added to my inferiority complex.

Due to my disability, the person who had brought me thought about placing me in a mandir where I would be treated with sympathy. Around that time, we learnt that the BAPS mandir in Adajan was being built. There was a small *hari* mandir at the time.

On meeting the sadhus, they agreed to let me stay and do *seva*. The word 'seva' was itself new to me. I had never even heard the name of 'Swaminarayan' before.

Somebody instructed me to mop the floor. Our homes were made of mud, so I didn't even know what a mop was. Yet, the sadhus arranged for me to stay and study in the BAPS *chhatralaya*. Due to my lack of finances, they provided for my admission fees, clothes, books, footwear, brush and even the smallest of things. I did not even know how to brush my teeth. But they lovingly taught me.

Gradually, I learnt about satsang. I wore a *kanthi* and began doing daily puja. After about ten months I returned to my village. Seeing the *tilak-chandlo* on my forehead, all my family members and the other villagers were astonished. Everyone especially came to see me at home, since my attire and appearance had changed dramatically.

At that time, we all ate meat. Addiction to *bidis* and tobacco was commonplace. In our community men also kept mistresses. Around 80% of the men in my village, had one, including my father. She had three children. They lived in a small hut on our premises. My mother was married to my father according to our village tradition, but he was steeped in addictions and other vices. All

our ancestors in my village and surrounding areas were like that. It was accepted as the norm.

After I became a *satsangi*, during my 1992 summer vacation, I started a *bal mandal* in my village. The children used to come, but my father and other parents would come in drunk and stop the assembly. So, I frequently changed the venue. Everyone viewed me as an enemy.

Whenever I returned home during vacations, I applied what I had learnt in Surat in my village. Slowly, some understanding villagers began to support my efforts to promote an addiction-free life. By Pramukh Swami Maharaj's blessings, in 1994, a satsang *sabha* was commenced in my village.

My area was regarded as educationally and financially underdeveloped, and the people were steeped in superstitions and vile habits. However, as my satsang strengthened, I took my friends and the youngsters of my family to Surat, where they engaged in *seva* and received guidance from the sadhus.

Over time, the local leaders began to trust us and cooperate and satsang spread to other villages.

Due to my staying in the *chhatralaya*, I progressed in my studies also. So, other youths also wished to stay there. Along with their studies, they would also do satsang and help to strengthen satsang in the villages.

In our district, there were no basic amenities and no awareness to create them. This was due to a lack of education and finance. However, as the education standards rose due to the BAPS satsang *mandals*, the new generation developed, not only individually, but also worked to develop their villages: new schools were built, a regular bus service was established, drinking water was supplied. Through government loans, farmers became more productive.

There are over a hundred youths from my village and the surrounding villages who have stayed in the Surat *chhatralaya*. Of these, around 30 now have homes in Surat.

As satsang and education increased, families

became more financially secure. Now, instead of mud huts, over 80% of families have concrete homes. Every home has a motorbike, many have tractors for farming and some even have cars. Everyone has benefitted and many facilities are now available in the villages, including tar or concrete roads and health clinics.

Previously, in our area, girls did not study. But after the BAPS *balika* and *yuvati mandals* were started, they too embraced studies and many now hold good jobs. Thus, through the blessings of Pramukh Swami Maharaj and the *chhatralaya*, a whirlwind of transformation has enveloped this area.

In Sadgavan there is now a beautiful BAPS hari mandir set in one acre of land. The satsang activities in the Sadgavan sector is coordinated by nirdeshak Shri Lakshmanbhai Patel. He, too, is a product of the chhatralaya. In Sadgavan, the weekly satsang sabhas for the elders, women, youths and children are held regularly. Throughout the sector, a total of 8 sanyukta, 4 mahila, 2 yuvak and 2 bal mandals have been established. In 18 surrounding villages, there are BAPS devotees who lead a devout, addiction-free life. Over 70% of villagers in Sadgavan have accepted satsang.

My father has also given up all his addictions and vices and now serves as the pujari in the mandir.

Whenever Swamishri visited Surat, he proactively enquired about our village, and gave guidance and blessings. He also instructed the sadhus to continually support us. While staying in the *chhatralaya*, I graduated with MA and LLB degrees. Presently, I serve as the assistant manager of the BAPS Pramukh Swami Hospital in Surat. I am also studying healthcare management.

I feel immensely satisfied with life and pray that I may serve according to the wishes of Pramukh Swami Maharaj and earn his innermost blessings.

THE FRUITS OF PERSISTENCE Hitesh Hindocha BAPS Chhatralaya, Vidyanagar

"Where should I go?"

This was the question with which Hitesh Hindocha, then a Class I officer in the Ahmedabad Municipal Corporation, approached Pramukh Swami Maharaj.

Swamishri analyzed the options he had presented and instructed, "Ireland."

So, Hitesh went to Dublin in Ireland and began work as a consultant for the Royal Bank of Scotland. His stay in Dublin marked the start of a greater spiritual journey.

Hitesh had earned a bachelor's degree in business administration while staying at the BAPS Swaminarayan Chhatralaya in Vallabh Vidyanagar. His faith in the BAPS satsang drove him to start a satsang *mandal* in Dublin. However, the first *sabha* was attended by only three people: Hitesh, his wife and a well-wisher.

Still, Hitesh was not disheartened. Every week, he phoned up to 50 people, inviting them to the *sabha*. He arranged special festival celebrations throughout the year. Soon, 50 families began attending the *sabha*. In 2004, they all combined to offer 327 vegetarian delicacies to Thakorji in the Annakut celebration.

The weekly *sabha* was held on Saturday evenings. From Friday to Saturday afternoon, Hitesh and his wife would prepare the food for all who came. They would then transport the food, utensils, PA system, *murtis* and other requirements for the *sabha* in two cars to the *sabha* venue. Through their efforts, today, around 150 families regularly engage in satsang.

His job required him to move from Dublin to Belfast. He started a satsang *mandal* there also. Hitesh recalls, "While I was at the BAPS Chhatralaya in Vidyanagar, I was greatly inspired by Pramukh Swami Maharaj and developed a liking for networking with care and affection. This is what we did in Dublin. First, we contacted



everyone. Then we gave great care and affection to all who came. We cared for them and their families. We arranged for their transport, if required. For those living alone, we packed extra food for them to take home."

Appreciating Hitesh's efforts, an Irish TV channel also broadcast a 5-minute account of his spiritual efforts. The devotees in Dublin still fondly remember Hitesh and his wife. One of them, Harishbhai, says, "Hiteshbhai frequently phoned me to invite me to satsang. But I would give some excuse and avoid attending. Yet, he lovingly continued to invite me. And one day, my inner voice told me that I should attend satsang."

Another devotee, Mahesh Shah, comments, "Before I started attending satsang, I smoked 20 cigarettes daily and drank alcohol heavily. Also, at the office I ate meat. So, I was hesitant to go to the *sabha*. I would tell him how bad I was. Hiteshbhai would encourage and tell me, 'Do not think negatively like that. Just come to the *sabha* regularly. Your addictions will go.' I remembered my late father continually telling me to stop my addictions. But I didn't listen to him. I even had many arguments with my wife about this. But, just by the darshan of Swamishri and Hiteshbhai's efforts, I stopped everything and began to observe the *niyams* of satsang. I regularly attend the *sabha* and am free of addictions."

When starting the BAPS *chhatralaya* activities, Yogiji Maharaj said, "This *chhatralaya* has started. It will prepare youths to be 'living' mandirs. Here, Kaliyug will be transformed into Satyug. From here, countless will benefit from Shastriji Maharaj's efforts for the *moksha* of all."

Through youths like Hitesh Hindocha, these visionary words of Yogiji Maharaj are being realized today.

FROM WILD TO CULTURED Liril Silvi BAPS Swaminarayan Chhatralaya, Mahesana

Liril Silvi was widely regarded as a wild and insolent youth. He was habituated to drugs, alcohol and other intoxicants. He enjoyed partying and roaming with his like-minded friends. As a result, everyone was frustrated with him. To him, studying was equivalent to death. That is why he had failed in seven subjects in the first three semesters of his mechanical engineering course.

Once, he was caught taking drugs red-handed by the police. The college principal reprimanded him severely. His parents pleaded with him to stop his harmful habits. But he ignored everyone, threatening to commit suicide. So, even his parents were at a loss about what to do.

Irritated by the daily admonishments of his professors, Liril left the college hostel to stay with friends in a rented room. This only added to Liril's personal independence. Daily, he indulged in alcohol and eating meat.

Among his friends, one, who did not have any such habits, daily told him to stop his indulgence. But Liril paid no attention to him.

One day, out of the blue, Liril had a thought that he wanted to give up his bad habits. But his bad company prevented him from giving them up. So, he thought that if he could get admission to a respectable *chhatralaya* he could change. His search led him to the BAPS *chhatralaya* in Mahesana.

Coincidently, one of Liril's friends stayed in the *chhatralaya*. Liril requested him to ask the management to give him admission. This *satsangi* friend told him bluntly that only if he stopped all his addictions and bad habits will he be enrolled in the *chhatralaya*. Liril reluctantly agreed to the conditions and began to stay in the *chhatralaya*.

The divine, peaceful atmosphere of the *chhatralaya* immediately touched Liril from within. Initially, however, he found the communal life a little tough and the rules restrictive. So, he would occasionally visit his other friends to smoke and drink. Soon, however, he began to regularly attend the *arti* and *sabha* in the *chhatralaya* and participated in the various cultural activities. He frequently had darshan of Pramukh Swami Maharaj and listened to his discourses. This divine atmosphere brought about a total transformation in his life. He severed all ties with his bad friends, and stopped his addictions and bad habits. He excelled in his studies and secured a place for higher studies at NIT Warangal in Hyderabad.

Whenever Liril is asked about his transformation and achievements, he is overcome with emotion and replies, "It is all due to Pramukh Swami Maharaj and the BAPS *chhatralaya*. If I had not been accepted in the *chhatralaya*, my life would have been like hell and wasted."

THE REWARDS OF VIRTUES Mit Sutariya BAPS Chhatralaya, Vidyanagar

Full of youthful enthusiasm, Mit Sutariya graduated with BSc and MSc degrees while staying at the BAPS Chhatralaya in Vidyanagar.

During his stay, he daily attended the *sab-has* and *arti*, and performed puja daily. He also

eagerly participated in the various activities of the *chhatralaya* as well as his college. He had also attained a high rank in the National Cadet Corps.

While staying in the *chhatralaya*, Mit developed a deep desire to serve India. On completing his studies, he got an opportunity to join the Indian Army.

After passing the initial tests, Mit was stationed in Bikaner as a lieutenant. Here, the values and skills of hard work, politeness and leadership helped him progress to the rank of captain.

Impressed by his performance in Bikaner, Mit was promoted to Acting Major and transferred to Kashmir. He had achieved in just a few years what would normally take more than ten.

Even while fulfilling his responsibilities in protecting India's borders as a respected major, Mit performs daily puja, and only then does he take breakfast. Seeing his steadfast adherence to such values has earned him widespread respect among his colleagues.

Fulfilling his duties as a major, he has resolved many issues related to the 250 soldiers under his command. He has ensured they receive nutritious and tasty food, clean water to drink and that their living quarters are clean. Above all, his humble and polite conduct has touched everyone. His ability to unite everyone and accomplish tasks has established him as a leader with great respect. But, when even his superiors praise him, Major Mit humbly says, "I give all the credit for my work to my guru Pramukh Swami Maharaj and the BAPS *chhatralaya*."

HELPING AN ORDINARY RURAL BOY Shri Yogesh Vandra BAPS Swaminarayan Chhatralaya, Vidyanagar

I was born to a poor family in the village of Khamba, Amreli district. My father was fortunate to have had Yogiji Maharaj's spiritual association. So, satsang was an intrinsic part of our family. But, because of our poor financial status I was worried about my future. I studied till the 10th

standard in Khamba. At that time I was absolutely ignorant about what to do further. During that time I met Pramukh Swami Maharaj. I asked for his blessings. Swamishri perceived my anxiety, and he asked me whether I wished to study further. I remained speechless because of my naivety. Swamishri talked to Yagnapriya Swami about admitting me to our hostel in Vidyanagar, despite getting average marks of 49 per cent in the 10th standard. I knew it was not possible to get admission in the *chhatralaya*, but Swamishri personally made all the arrangements.

In the years that followed I attained a bachelor's degree in electronics engineering. During my stay there Swamishri often came to our *chhatralaya*. His presence infused joy and celebration among the students. Most of the students presented some activity to please Swamishri. However, as I did not have any special skills or talents I felt inferior. But then, with time, due to Yagnapriya Swami's and other sadhus' care, my inferiority complex disappeared. They gave me different roles to play in dramas performed before Swamishri from 1991 to 1995. Swamishri would be pleased with my acting and he would bless me. He thus took care of me and never made me feel small.

Ouite often we students used to make Swamishri laugh while he walked back to his residence after completing his puja at the chhatralaya grounds. Once, I was walking funnily besides him and I told Swamishri to bless me so that my height would increase. The fact was that I was physically slim, short and dark. To this, Swamishri replied, "Who says your height has not increased! Tell me where were you staying before? What type of village were you living in? Where are your parents? How did you come here? Yesterday, nearly 10,000 people saw you perform on stage. Now tell me haven't we increased your height [popularity]?" On hearing this I was dumbfounded. What Swamishri had said was true. Through his grace I had become popular - in fact he had increased my prestige.

Till 1995, I stayed at the chhatralaya and

completed my college education due to Swamishri's generosity. Thereafter, I was puzzled about how to get a job or to what to do next. At that time I went to Mumbai to serve for Swamishri's Amrut Mahotsay. When I entered the mandir in Dadar with my baggage Swamishri arrived for Thakorji's darshan. There was a throng of devotees for Swamishri's darshan. Swamishri saw me amongst the crowd and lovingly asked, "You've arrived!" I replied, "Yes. I've completed my bachelor's degree in electronics. But now I don't know what to do." Swamishri replied, "I'll take care of that." And he told me to stay to do seva at the Dadar mandir. I stayed and did seva till the end of Amrut Mahotsav. During the Mahotsav there was a special assembly to celebrate 30 years of the Akshar-Purushottam Chhatralaya (APC) in Vidyanagar. Swamishri presided over that assembly and I also got an opportunity to meet him one-on-one. Swamishri told me to sit down before him, and he asked, "Have you got a job?" Before I could answer, Swamishri called Bhagvatcharan Swami and told him, "Make arrangements for his further studies and a job in Mumbai. Also, find a marriage partner for him and, in future, his children should stay and study at the chhatralaya in Vidyanagar." Thus, Swamishri shouldered all my responsibilities.

I was an ordinary youth, but Swamishri supported me immensely. I am not a stray case, but he has blessed innumerable youths with his selfless generosity and love.

SELFLESS AND ABUNDANT LOVE Sandeep Dheer

On the morning of 7 December 1993, Swamishri performed the *murti-pratishtha* rituals at the new assembly hall of APC, Vidyanagar. That evening a special assembly was held. The programme included a presentation by two groups of students before Swamishri. Each team had to make stage presentations to prove that Swamishri belonged to them. A sadhu told me that since I was a Punjabi, I should don a Punjabi dress and

participate in the programme. Swamishri was scheduled to arrive on the stage at 5.00 p.m. So, five minutes before his arrival, I came and stood by the entrance to the stage dressed in a traditional Punjabi attire. At that time Yagnapriya Swami was also standing there. He asked me why I had come there. I told him I was going to perform before Swamishri and say that he was mine. Then he asked me, "Have you practised for it?" I said no. So, he stopped me and explained, "All the youths who are going to perform on stage have practised. You cannot perform without practising." I realized later that he was right, but at that time I became depressed. I left without saying a word, crestfallen, towards an empty room in the old block and cried profusely. A few minutes later, I heard that Swamishri had arrived on stage. So, I hurriedly changed my clothes and sat in the last line of the assembly. My fellow students performed commendably. Swamishri then addressed the assembly, and thereafter everyone came to him one by one to touch his feet. I was last, and as I advanced after touching his feet, Swamishri pulled my T-shirt to my surprise. He lovingly said, "Dheer, today everyone said that Swami is mine but why didn't you say anything?" Then Swamishri put his finger on my chest and said in Hindi, "Let others say so, but I am yours." Then he said, "I want to keep you in my heart." On hearing this, I was simply stupefied.

My years at the *chhatralaya* in Vidyanagar are replete with wonderful memories of Swamishri's selfless and abundant love. Whenever I remember them in difficult and testing times I find myself rejuvenated and happy. I am forever indebted to Swamishri and the *chhatralaya*.

SERVICE AND SACRIFICE Viveknidhi Swami

Hundreds of students who had lived at the BAPS Chhatralayas have settled abroad after their graduation. They have lucrative jobs, yet they live frugally, abide by satsang *niyams* and spend their free time in doing *seva* at the local mandir. I

would like to share a couple of incidents of their selfless services and sacrifice.

Dinesh, a satsangi youth, had recently arrived from India. On ekadashi he observed a waterless fast. Since he was new in America he did not know how to prepare khichdi for parna. He was bewildered about what to have for parna. Then he remembered a chhatralaya student named Rathin Raval. Dinesh rang him up and said, "I have observed a waterless fast on ekadashi today. If it is convenient for you I'd like you to help me for my parna." Now the rider to Dinesh's request was that he wanted to do parna after midnight. So, Rathin jotted down Dinesh's address and told him that he would make the arrangements. Rathin lived a one-and-a-half hour's drive from Dinesh. At 1.30 a.m., Dinesh's doorbell chimed. On opening the door, Dinesh saw Rathin with a pressure cooker in his hands. Dinesh was surprised. Then Rathin served hot khichdi and drove back home soon after. Dinesh appreciated Rathin's spirit of seva – an outcome of the values he had learnt in the chhatralaya.



One then realizes the fruits of having stayed at the *chhatralayas* and received Swamishri's abundant care and grace.

Pramukh Swami Maharaj

A Sculptor of Youths



INTRODUCTION

Pramukh Swami Maharaj has a unique aptitude to understand youths, and also to help them understand others. He has discoursed to them, but his talks have never weighed them down. He has transformed them, but they have not felt the convulsions of change.

Pramukh Swami Maharaj has liberated countless youths from the harrowing issues of life. A renowned educationist, the late Shri Ramlal Parikh, who was the vice-chancellor of Gujarat Vidyapith in Ahmedabad, echoes his experience about how Pramukh Swami Maharaj fosters the youths, "In my 35 years of experience in education, I feel that we teachers are unable to inspire students. But by coming to Pramukh Swami Maharaj, I have found that the youths sacrifice their time, energy, talent and expertise at his call. Students who refuse to touch litter and dirt in schools are ready to endeavour, sweat and sacrifice themselves before Swamishri. This proves that the capacity to transform them

lies in the path shown by Swamishri. I am fully convinced about this. We guide students in doing PhDs on 'Morality in Action', but we cannot help them live or experience it. Whereas, here, before Pramukh Swami Maharaj, we can see it being practised."

What is the elixir that Pramukh Swami Maharaj possesses in transforming the lives of youths? The answer is, selfless love for others. Many dissertations can be written about his selfless love for students and others and the impact it has on them. Whenever Pramukh Swami Maharaj arrives at a BAPS *chhatralaya*, school or a satsang assembly full of children or youths, they all celebrate with joy. The vibrant scene absorbs anyone and everyone. It is amazing how Swamishri has cared by meeting innumerable students and youths personally, by talking to them on the phone or through writing letters. The resulting mutual bonds created reflect a unique spiritual experience.

Some of the incidents of Swamishri's love and care for students are as follows.

CARES FOR ALL

"People don't care how much you know until they know how much you care." The point to be made here is that two persons enter each other's hearts through the channel of mutual care. Volumes can be written about how Pramukh Swami Maharaj has cared for students.

On 14 July 2007, about 2,000 youths were attending a *shibir* in USA. Several questions were asked to the audience in one of the sessions:

"If Swamishri has named you or your son, please stand up." Many youths stood up.

"If Swamishri has advised or given guidance to any youth, please stand up." Again many youths got up from their seats.

"Youths who have had a telephone conversation with Swamishri may stand up." A lot more youths stood up.

"Youths who were inspired by Swamishri

during their academic years stand up." Once again there were many youths who responded.

In conclusion, it was observed that all the youths in the assembly had stood up by the time the questions were over.

Over the decades, Swamishri has remembered and communicated with countless youths in India and abroad. It is because of his spiritual nourishment and support that countless youths have remained steadfast in practising the satsang *niyams* despite facing enticements and obstacles.

Once a disabled youth came up to Swamishri and expressed his woes: "I come from Pune. I lost my parents way back, so I was raised by my grandfather. But recently, my uncle wants to claim my share of the property. Now what should I do and where should I go? I'm in a dilemma. I've got an admission for B.E. Electronics in a college in remote Simla, but I'm penniless."

The hapless youth then broke down. Swamishri was moved by his situation. He patted the youth and reassured him, "Don't worry!" Immediately, Swamishri made the financial and other arrangements for his college studies. The youth beamed with joy and hope. He thanked Swamishri.

On another occasion a bright but financially poor youth came to Swamishri in Atladara. He revealed that he was asked by an official to give him a bribe of Rs 500,000 to pass a government exam. The youth gave up appearing for the exam and decided to give the UPSC (Union Public Service Commission) exam. Swamishri made all the arrangements to help him, saying, "Give the exams. Whenever you need any help come and see me. There's no need for you to worry anymore."

Once, Swamishri was engaged in Thakorji's darshan in Mumbai. Rasikbhai Ajmera was standing nearby. On seeing him, Swamishri asked a sadhu for a rose placed at the feet of Thakorji. Then, he gave it to Rasikbhai and said, "Here, take this and give it to Pintu (Rasikbhai's son) because he is appearing for his 10th standard

exams." Swamishri's blessings not only touched Rasikbhai but his gesture also infused confidence and joy in Pintu when he received the rose.

A brilliant youth was studying in a prestigious college in Ahmedabad. But because of his parents' conflict the youth was disturbed and unable to perform well at college. He had written the details of his predicament in a letter to Swamishri. In his reply, Swamishri advised, "Give up all your worries and progress in your studies. I am instructing you to study. You may be thinking about how to bear the cost of your education, but do not fret. You will get financial help as per your needs. Thus, do not worry about excelling in your education."


Swamishri assured the youth of getting monetary help and relieved him of his anxiety. Thereafter, Swamishri also encouraged him regularly through letters to study properly. Today, the youth is a graduate and has a lucrative job.

Swamishri is a custodian of youth welfare and their all-round development. Just as he emphasizes upon the youths to practise integrity, he also equally lays stress on them to attain good academic results.

On 21 June 2002, Swamishri advised the sadhus handling the *kishore mandal* in Mumbai, "Pay attention to the students' academic performance. Just as they are active in satsang activities they should also work hard for their studies. They should not fail and miss out a year." Swamishri earnestly expressed his concern about nurturing the youths academically.

Once, Swamishri cautioned the administrators of the BAPS Chhatralaya in Atladara, "Take care that students receive proper education, facilities and values. You should not be overly inclined towards decorating their residential buildings. Make efforts in grooming the students culturally. Also, endeavour and spend money for them to attain good results in their studies."

Thus, Swamishri has always made efforts for the holistic development of students. He provides




grants and scholarships for the needy and has established schools, colleges, *chhatralayas* and *gurukuls* for the students.

ABUNDANT APPRECIATIONS

Swamishri has always been generous in appreciating children and youths. This is one aspect of his abundant love for youths.

Once, someone asked Swamishri, "Do you ever despair when we we fail to live up to your wishes and benchmarks of good behaviour?" Swamishri replied, "How can a soul match with God's standards. A soul is after all a soul – enwrapped by worldly desires. The essential thing is that it has come onto the path of God. Shriji Maharaj, too, had a broad mind. The fact that a person has come into the association of God is a great thing. He will thus gradually understand and attain liberation."

Swamishri's words exude compassion and magnanimity. Despite a person's failings he does not harbour an iota of aversion for him. Swamishri has never made a hue and cry about a rose plant having thorns. He only sees the rose bud that blossoms forth amidst the thorns. Likewise, he focuses on the growth of youths regardless of



their faults.

When parents cry, "Youths have become spoiled"; teachers vehemently declare, "Youths have become delinquent"; spiritual masters opine, "The youths have turned into atheists"; Swamishri perceives the goodness of God in them.

Once, Swamishri spoke to an assembly of youths, "You are all the children of God." With such an exalted vision how could Swamishri harp upon their faults? In fact, all his life he has focused on their virtues, encouraged them and offered his love.

When the youths are appreciated and honoured for their good works and actions they feel positively inspired, which subsequently brings out their true potential. Thus, recognitions motivate the youths towards good behaviour. Swamishri perceives the youths in this manner.

In 1990, an International Youth Convention was held in Vidyanagar. More than 21,000 male and female students had participated in several competitions: recitations of the Vachanamrut, Swamini Vato and kirtans; elocution; singing and others. On the final day of the five-day convention, Swamishri blessed all in the morning session.

He said, "The convention has turned out to be unparalleled. I congratulate you all for staying here for five days. You have tolerated the heat, exercised patience and made this event a success. You have all put in remarkable efforts. The mukhpath you have done is greater than having attained ashtanga yoga. Maharaj and Swami will forever be with you in your life. To offer countless prostrations to you would not be enough. It is not possible for today's youths to put in such [intense] effort and do such works. It is no small matter that some of you have memorized the entire Vachanamrut. I am humbled by this and bow to you. My appreciations to you all." Swamishri spoke with vigour and passion while he was standing before the assembly. When he finished, it seemed that he was not satisfied with paying tributes to the youths. So, he called the volunteers responsible for the assembly arrangements and instructed them, "I would like to meet all the youths one by one." When the announcement was made that Swamishri would like to bless all the youths personally, a rapturous applause rent the air. Despite the scorching summer heat and dust Swamishri blessed every youth by placing his hand on their head from 11:30 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. By the time Swamishri had blessed the last youth his eyebrows were laced with dust and his clothes had become wet due to sweat. Someone uttered, "Look at the terrible heat!" Swamishri interjected, "Instead of saying that look at the efforts of the youths!"

In 2009, during the annual students celebration at the chhatralaya in Vidyanagar, a drama was performed on how Shreyans Dholakiya, a former hostel student, remained staunch in following the satsang niyams. Shreyans was not present on that day, but he came to the chhatralaya the next morning. When Swamishri was informed about it, he called Shreyans onto the stage after performing his morning puja, and honoured him with a garland of flowers. Swamishri praised him, "Congratulations! You live the values that your father has taught you. You have tolerated many things. I bless you for a happier life." Then Swamishri took out his own mala from his neck and placed it on Shreyans' neck to express his appreciation and rajipo.

Once the students of Vidyanagar chhatralaya had observed austerities, namely, dhara-parna and chandrayan. They all wished to conclude their austerities before Swamishri and receive his blessings. So, they all went to Bochasan, and stood in a line to meet Swamishri. Someone informed Swamishri that once the boys have received his blessings, they would go out and receive prasad of mesub from Tyagvallabh Swami. But Swamishri told the volunteer to bring the prasad to him because he wanted to give it to them personally. In this way Swamishri personally gave mesub to each one of the youths for parna. Though the youths had not desired to receive prasad from Swamishri's hands, Swamishri, however, celebrated their austerities in a memorable and appreciative way. The youths departed with elation and an everlasting memory.

Very often youths succumb to depression because of the pressures and tensions of life. During such times, Swamishri has always encouraged and

appreciated them and thus rejuvenated their enthusiasm and efforts.

Once, a student sighed before Swamishri, "Will I pass in my exams or not? After graduating, will I get a job or not?" Swamishri read his mindset and said, "Look, you are going to pass. Believe it, and work hard. Otherwise, you will simply end up achieving nothing. What benefit is there in worrying unnecessarily? So, work hard. By doing nothing, will you accomplish anything?" Swamishri's crisp words infused inner strength and confidence in the youth.

Once a youth in Vidyanagar brought his friend before Swamishri and described his mental state, "Swami, he is in the 12th standard. He is depressed." Swamishri looked at him and called him near and patted him on his shoulders. Then Swamishri advised, "You have entered the 12th standard. Never ever think about failing. Live in the present and don't think too much about the future. By studying and worshipping God now your future will be good. So, entertain such thoughts daily and be strong."

The period of youth has been compared to the breaking of dawn – when the sun is crimson and beautiful. However, no one would like the sun to set instantly without ascending to its illustrious noon-state. Likewise, how could Swamishri allow a youth who is in his prime to simply crumple without achieving or contributing anything. Swamishri appreciates and instils encouragement and hope in crestfallen youths to make them vibrant and productive.

A youth was plagued with negative thoughts, "I am of no use to anyone. I am not worthy of living in this world." Because of such thoughts he became depressed. He also perceived others to be worthless. Swamishri encouraged him, saying, "God and his Sadhu have compassion for you. So, you will progress. Give up your flimsy beliefs and rely on God's divine strength. He will give you the fruits of your karmas. Why do you think negatively? No one is bad in this world.

When others can do work, why can't you? You do not know your own strength. A person can achieve whatever he wills; but it obviously takes some time. So, you must not allow weak thoughts to enter your mind. You have the potential to look after everyone [in your family]. You have the capacity to inspire thousands to worship God. So, be happy. You have not spoiled anyone's life. Neither have you been born to cry and be miserable. Live with camaraderie with all your family members. Whenever you err, there is no need to wallow in misery! Rectify your mistakes. Don't dump weak and wrong thoughts in your mind; give them up and forget them."

Swamishri's discourse to the youth can be called the 'Pramukh Gita'. His discourses have revived countless youths from depression and despair.

HEALS BY LISTENING

Dr Hari H. Bhatt of New York once narrated how he had reconciled with himself after a near fatal accident had left him with paraplegia. He says, "We are all here – those of us on the stage, in front of the stage and behind the stage – because somehow our lives have been touched by Pujya Pramukh Swami Maharaj. Let me tell you my story. While growing up I was an outgoing athletic kid. But it all came to a crashing halt in my first year of college. I had a car accident that left me unable to walk.

"My life and the lives of the people closest to me were shaken. From being an academic and athletic wonder boy, I now had to struggle to even move a toe or bear the pain of the simplest movement. I felt my present, and worse, my future had been cruelly snatched away – left in the ruin of a smashed up Mercedes. I was confused and depressed. Hope was slipping, but even more painfully, I could sense the anguish of my friends and family.

"But one of the great saviours at that time in my life, for me and for my parents, was the magnificent fortune we had in the form of Bapa. We had in our lives a guru who is an undisguised form of all that is good in humanity – and when I opened my heart, to pour out my grief, my dreams, my insecurities, he listened.

"At that moment in my life, he was there for me, with his hand on the shoulder of a boy in a wheelchair becoming a man. I won't get into the specifics of that conversation with a sadhu who has millennial wisdom.

"It was a private moment that has had its lasting effects in the way I see the world and my role in it. But I will tell you that it was a great man listening to a confused child. And more than just the guidance of his words, there was the peace and healing from having him listen to me. And whether it is between friends, family, enemies or sadhus and *haribhaktas* – listening is the greatest form of love.

"I want to thank you Bapa for listening to me, and helping me and giving faith-affirming strength to my parents. Your love has been an unending source of peace lighting my spirit – showing me that true miracles are within us. This is a credo that has enabled me to not only accomplish what I have, but more importantly, to continue to strive for greater things.

"Thank you Bapa for your blessings."

Swamishri values the youths, which is evident from his unflagging efforts in dissolving their woes, and in providing support and instilling confidence and courage in times of difficulty and challenges.

VALUES THE YOUTHS

Once, Swamishri was not keeping well, so he had decided to rest in Bochasan. During that time the youths from Vidyanagar *chhatralaya* came and urged Swamishri, "Give us your illness." Swamishri replied, "I don't want to give it to you. Through you I would like to inspire satsang in others. Today, there is turmoil in society. May you all prepare yourself to serve our society, nation

and Satsang. It is important that our society becomes truly religious, and that you inspire others to tread the path of dharma."

Swamishri's words echo how he values and trusts the youths.

Once, Swamishri was at the *chhatralaya* in Vidyanagar. A student asked Swamishri while he was having his meal, "You should be awarded the Noble Peace Prize." Instantly Swamishri replied, "For me, you, the youths and sadhus are the Nobel Prize. When you all grow up you'll do noble works. You'll do satsang and inspire satsang in countless people." Swamishri's perception of youths is amazing. How much he values and believes in them!

Swamishri's love for youths has often been reflected by his physical exertions and tolerating hardships for them.

On 3 May 1985, Swamishri was on a hectic round of home visits (*padhramanis*) in a village. The summer sun was scorching. With his last *padhramani* over at around 12 noon, Swamishri was returning to a devotee's home for lunch. Midway a mentally unstable boy asked Swamishri to come to his home. Everyone accompanying Swamishri became agitated. But Swamishri calmly asked, "Where's your home? You walk ahead, I'll follow you." Swamishri visited his home and pleased him.

There are countless such instances in which Swamishri has tolerated physical discomforts and hardships to please youths and devotees.

On another occasion a youth studying at the medical college in Jamnagar invited Swamishri to sanctify his apartment. When Swamishri reached his home, the roof was leaking. Swamishri did not utter a single word of complaint. The youth then regretted and apologized, "Swami, I'm sorry for not being able to make proper arrangements for you." Instantly, Swamishri defused his remorse, "I am comfortable and happy. There is no need for you to say sorry and feel sad."

CONCLUSION

When we contemplate about the incidents of Swamishri's profound love for youths it becomes difficult to guage whether Swamishri is a mother or father of youths or their friend or guru. In fact, all mundane descriptions about his infinite love for them are inadequate.

Because of Swamishri's love, the youths sacrifice everything to obey his single command. They have shown the alacrity to serve in the aftermath of tsunamis, destructive earthquakes, flood disasters and epidemics, and during famines or devastating land storms.

On 17 December 2005, Air Marshal of India Shri Jain opined before Swamishri in Gandhinagar, "For years I've been witnessing that whenever our country has faced catastrophes, be it a tsunami or an earthquake, two organizations have always come to help first. One is the Indian Air Force and the second is your service-oriented organization. I have seen this personally from 1982 when there was a devastating storm between Jamnagar and Junagadh. I saw your volunteers and sadhus engaged in relief work in Mangrol, where I was appointed as the officer-in-charge. The employees of the local management arrived three days later!"

These incidents and testimonials reflect how Swamishri has groomed countless youths. As a sculptor of thousands of students and youths through his selfless efforts and love Swamishri has inspired character, education and personality development. The vision and efforts of Yogiji Maharaj and Pramukh Swami Maharaj in establishing *chhatralayas*, schools and weekly youth assemblies (*yuvak-yuvati mandals*) have worked wonders in the lives of innumerable youths. They are indebted to Swamishri for his selfless love and efforts in grooming them for a better and happier life.

n 31 January 1954, the auspicious day of Vasant Panchami, Yogiji Maharaj was travelling by train from Anand to Atladara with some youths. The train was chugging through the countryside, passing by one farm after another. Suddenly, Dr Ramanbhai Patel (now Pujya Dr Swami) pointed at the Agriculture College in Anand and said, "Look Bapa, that is the Agriculture College where Vinubhai (now Pujya Mahant Swami) studies." Yogiji Maharaj looked at the college and uttered with folded palms, "Jai to Vinubhai's college. We shall build a college of *brahmavidya* opposite it."

In 1965, Yogiji Maharaj fulfilled his dream by inaugurating the Akshar-Purushottam Chhatralaya (APC) in Vidyanagar. Ambalalbhai Karsandas Patel, a staunch devotee, donated his invaluable land for the construction of the APC. After Yogiji Maharaj performed the foundation-stone laying ceremony, the construction work began with the efforts of sadhus and devotees. On 20 June 1965, Yogiji Maharaj inaugurated the spacious students' hostel complex in Vidyanagar. It was a historical moment, which subsequently launched the saga of the college of *brahmavidya*.

Yogiji Maharaj often visited the APC and inspired the students. He inculcated faith and values in them through his selfless love and wisdom. His efforts have been continued by Pramukh Swami Maharaj who, through his regular visits, has fostered values and spiritual faith in the students. As a result the *chhatralaya* has produced sterling youths. Furthermore, after graduating,

these youths have spread values and worked for the betterment of society and growth of Satsang.

On Sunday, 27 December 2015, the Akshar-Purushottam Chhatralaya of Vidyanagar celebrated its 50th anniversary. The year-long celebrations from 2014-2015 engaged present and past students of all the BAPS *chhatralayas* in several programmes and activities. Two grand assemblies for launching the Golden Jubilee Celebrations were held at the *chhatralayas* in Bhavnagar and Vidyanagar. Pilgrimage walks were organized at Vidyanagar, Gondal and other *chhatralayas*. An *adhiveshan* (competition) involving students from all *chhatralayas* was held at Atladara. A spiritual *shibir* was organized by the BAPS Chhatralaya in Nadiad at the Sankari mandir.

On 13 December 2015, Pramukh Swami Maharaj lit the inaugural lamp at Sarangpur for the grand finale Golden Jubilee Celebrations to be held in Vidyanagar. Thereafter, the *chhatralaya* students presented a traditional dance and invited Swamishri to grace the occasion.

On 26 December 2015, a convention of 220 sadhus, who had formerly resided at the BAPS

chhatralayas during their academic years, was held in Vidyanagar. They recollected their experiences during their student years at the chhatralayas and also reminisced about Swamishri's divine incidents and personal inspirations.

On the morning of 27 December an assembly of all the BAPS Chhatralaya alumni was held at the APC in Vidyanagar. The former students shared their experiences and inspirations. The assembly also honoured all the devotees who presently offer services at all BAPS *chhatralayas*.

On the evening of 27 December 2015 an annakut was offered to Thakorji at the chhatralaya. Thereafter, the grand finale of the Golden Jubilee Celebrations was held at Akshar Farm in Vidyanagar. The celebration programme was themed on "Educational Values and Personality Development". It was attended by 12,000 past and present students and invited guests, along with more than 300 BAPS sadhus.

Among the prominent invited guests who attended were: Shri C.L. Patel (Chairman of Charutar Vidya Mandal), Shri B.G. Patel (vice-chancellor of Changa Charusat University), Shri

Sodhi (MD of GCMUF), Shri Ratnam (MD Amul Dairy), Shri B.M. Vyas (Technical Director of NDDB), and many principals, professors and teachers of prominent schools and colleges.

The celebration programme commenced at 5.50 p.m. in the presence of Swamishri's Shri Harikrishna Maharaj and senior sadhus: Pujya Dr Swami, Pujya Kothari Swami, Pujya Tyagvallabh Swami and Pujya Viveksagar Swami. A welcome dance by youths greeted Shri Harikrishna Maharaj. Then the master of ceremonies, Adarshjivan Swami, gave a preamble to the celebrations and welcomed all for the event.

Pujya Viveksagar Swami spoke about the milestone events in the making of the *chhatralaya* in Vidyanagar. This was followed by a video featuring the *chhatralaya* activities during the last 50 years.

A drama was performed by youths based on the celebration theme: "Educational Values and Personality Development." The entire programme comprised of skits, speeches and videos revealing the elements of education, personality development and values taught at the *chhatralayas*. The first part portrayed the *chhatralayas*' contributions in the educational progress of students. This was presented through a traditional dance based on the lyrics: "Ame chhātralaya nā khode khelyā... ame runi Yogiraj nā, ame runi Pramukh Swami nā."

Yogiji Maharaj had blessed that the *chhatra-laya* would produce doctors and engineers. The number of students who have since studied from all the BAPS Chhatralayas and graduated in various academic fields was projected on a screen: 566 doctors, 6,685 engineers, 451 pharmacists, 378 postgraduates, 1,054 science graduates, 1,209 graduates in other faculties, one pilot, one IAS, 89 chartered accountants, 25 company secretaries and 36 lawyers.

The second part of the celebration programme portrayed how the *chhatralayas* have helped students develop their personality. Atmatrupt Swami conducted the presentations. The theme was introduced with a bhakti dance, performed by youths, based on the lyrics "*Lākho jano ni dotmā*...". Then, a drama titled 'Aflatun Officer' showed how youths at the *chhatralayas* develop

a holistic personality. The drama featured the success story of Mit Sutariya, a former student of Vidyangar Chhatralaya and presently a soldier in the Indian army. The drama showed how Mit, after being groomed at the *chhatralaya*, was able to discharge his duties diligently in the army. Subsequently, he was promoted as an acting major. The inspiring drama was performed by the students of Nadiad and Atladara *chhatralayas*.

The final part of the celebration programme presented how the *chhatralayas* have been pivotal in instilling spiritual values in students. As a preamble, the youths performed a traditional dance. Then a video was screened to show how students are moulded spiritually through their daily routine at the *chhatralayas*.

Thereafter, the effects of Swamishri's visits on the students and the influence of sadhus at the *chhatralayas* were presented through a video. Even those who were morally errant were transformed during their stay. The true story of Liril Silvi's transformation, who stayed at the BAPS Chhatralaya in Mahesana, was enacted by youths.

The BAPS hostel students were also inspired to serve society selflessly through Swamishri's life, work and teachings. A video was screened on how the *chhatralaya* students serve society, providing rescue and relief during natural calamities, and participating in anti-addiction campaigns and self-awareness programmes.

Pujya Yagnapriya Swami spoke about incidents of Swamishri's divine charisma in inspiring hundreds of *chhatralaya* students to renounce and become sadhus. Thereafter, a video was shown about Swamishri's love and sacrifice for the *chhatralaya* students.

To pay tributes to Swamishri's divine works a 'Torch Dance' was performed by the students of Vidyanagar Chhatralaya. The youths marched onto the stage and danced to the beats of the lyric "Mashāl, mashāl, divya mashāl...".

in remaining steadfast in satsang niyams and also in serving Swamishri and the BAPS with body, mind and means. Ltd), Shri Kishoresinh Jhala (CEO, MMFG), Shri Chunilal Nadpara (Secretary, Narmada Water Resources), Shri Jagmal Pithiya (Industrialist) and Shri Dhananjay Nakrani (Google Co.).

An inspiring video was shown about how Shri Hiteshbhai Hindocha, a former *chhatralaya* student of Vidyanagar, developed Satsang in Dublin, Ireland. His faith in Swamishri and the efforts he and his wife made in celebrating Hindu festivals and conducting satsang assemblies were also portrayed in the video. The entire audience was left





- Please Bhagwan Swaminarayan by developing profound attachment and affection towards such a Gunatit Satpurush – Pramukh Swami Maharaj.
- Fully understand the Vedic doctrine of Akshar-Purushottam as revealed by Bhagwan Swaminarayan.

- Imbibe in one's life the eternal spiritual principles taught by Pramukh Swami Maharaj.
- Offer selfless service, like Pramukh Swami Maharaj has done throughout his life.
- Serve guruhari Pramukh Swami Maharaj through mind, words and deeds, and reflect upon our obligations towards him.

In short, the Centenary Celebrations are an opportunity for all to follow in the footsteps of Pramukh Swami Maharaj.

Hence, as directed by the *sadguru* sadhus, devotees are requested to undertake *yog-yagna niyams* from the list below.

1. Guru Vanchan Yagna - Year 1

Read the three books: Transcendence (Eng) / Paratpar (Guj), Eternal Virtues/Jena Gune Rijhya Girdhari and Pure Devotion/ Para Bhakti.

It is estimated that by reading five minutes daily, these three books can be read twice in one year.

Next year, other books will be prescribed for reading.



2. Guru Lekhan Yagna - All Years

The pre-printed Amrutvachan Pothi will have quotations describing the glory and inclination of a true guru at the top of each page. Daily writing of these divine words of Bhagwan Swaminarayan and *guruhari* Pramukh Swami Maharaj will strengthen one's understanding and resolve.

Each book has 96 pages. By writing one page daily (approx. 10 minutes), four books can be completed in one year.

3. Guru Shravan Yagna - Year 1

Listen for 7-10 minutes to Pramukh Swami Maharaj's audio blessings every day.

A selection of 60 mp3 files of Swamishri's blessings have been released. So, daily listening will enable one to listen to each six times in one year.

The mp3 files are available from www.baps. org for listening online or download. Also, a CD will be available from each satsang centre.

4. Guru Darshan Yagna - Year 1

Daily, have the video darshan of Pramukh Swami Maharaj for 7-10 minutes.

A total of 90 videos have been selected for viewing. A DVD of these is available from BAPS bookstores.

Daily viewing will enable one to view each video four times in one year.

5. Guru Bhakti Yagna - All Years

- Turn five extra malas daily for Swamishri's health.
- Observe a fast on the *sud* 8 of every month.



One can undertake to observe 3, 6, 9 or 12 fasts throughout the year. (Those who observe a fast on *sud* 9 should not take this *niyam*.)

 Daily contemplate for five minutes on the glory of Pramukh Swami Maharaj – his virtues, work and divine form.

6. Guru Katha Yagna

Every week, narrate a new incident about Pramukh Swami Maharaj to as many friends and relatives as possible. This can be done in person, by phone, by letter, or through email or social media.

Select an incident from Eternal Virtues/Jena Gune Rijhya Girdhari.

7. Collective Niyams for Mandals - All Years

- On a Sunday before or after the *sud* 8, arrange a *prabhat* (morning) or *sandhya* (evening) *feri* (small procession) and chant the *dhun*.
- Sequential Fasting: In each mandal, one different person should observe a fast every day. If more than 30 enrol, assign each a fixed date every month. Thus, on some dates, more than one person may be fasting.

[Note: Do not involve young children in this *niyam*.]

8. Family Niyams

- Ghar Sabha: The individual *niyams* 1, 3 and 4 can be done in a daily family assembly.
- Once every month, invite different families to your *ghar sabha* and encourage them to conduct a daily *ghar sabha*.



October to December 2015 & January 2016, Sarangpur

OCTOBER 2015

1, Thursday; Shastriji Maharaj's Smruti Parva

At 10.55 a.m. Swamishri went for darshan at Yagnapurush Smruti Mandir to pay homage to guru Shastriji Maharaj on the occasion of the Smruti Parya.

The Smruti Parva assembly had commenced at 8.15 a.m. in Pramukh Darshan Vatika. Senior sadhus, Pujya Ghanshyamcharan Swami, Pujya Viveksagar Swami, Pujya Ishwarcharan Swami and Pujya Kothari Bhaktipriya Swami eulogized on Shastriji Maharaj.

Swaminarayan Yagna for World Peace

14 & 15 November 2015, Sarangpur



As part of the year-long Centenary Celebrations of BAPS Swaminarayan Mandir, Sarangpur, a mammoth *yagna* for world peace was held for two days on the Fuldol Festival grounds, behind Swaminarayan Vidyamandir, Sarangpur.

A grand *yagnashala* was erected with 363 *yagna kunds* and a main stage in the centre with nine main *yagna kunds*. The *yagna* commenced at 8.00 a.m. in the presence of Pujya Mahant Swami, Pujya Tyagvallabh Swami, Pujya Viveksagar Swami and other senior sadhus. The *yagna* was organized under the guidance of Shrutiprakash Swami and Bhadresh Swami and conducted by Shri Mukeshbhai Shastri, Vasudevbhai Shastri and 130 assistant Brahmins.






CELEBRATING Transcendence


The programme concluded with singing of the South African and Indian national anthems with pride.

Summary of BAPS Charities

North America Activities 2015

WALKATHONS

Over 17,127 well-wishers and devotees walked over 52,500 miles in the Walkathons organized in 54 cities in the United States and Canada in support of their local communities. Individuals of all ages and from all backgrounds helped to raise support and awareness for a wide range of community, health and humanitarian organizations. Thus helping to build a better community, one step at a time.



Over 9,420 (since 2006: 96,583) people in 46 North American cities benefitted from the Annual Health Fairs. Over 1,500 doctors and other medical professionals (since 2006: 14,862) volunteered their time and insights to provide medical care and counsel to people who often lack access to such resources.







HEALTH LECTURES

Over 23,000 people attended the 148 health lectures organized in 62 cities throughout North America on dozens of relevant topics. These lectures are a valuable resource that help improve health and preventive care.

BLOOD DRIVES

A total of 1,032 pints of blood was collected (since 2006: 9,073 pints) from the Blood Drives held in 27 cities throughout North America. BAPS Charities has long been actively answering this urgent and continuing need by organizing blood donation drives for the benefit of communities throughout the world.

CHILDREN'S HEALTH AND SAFETY DAYS

Conducted by 474 volunteer doctors and medical service professionals, over 1,934 children, and 724 parents and caretakers in 18 cities participated in the Children's Health and Safety Days. The sessions encouraged dialogue between children and their families about healthy living, while providing participants with the tools and resources to make better lifestyle choices.

BONE MARROW DRIVES

Since 2006, 90 Bone Marrow Drives have been organized, resulting in 6,040 donors joining the national registry to make themselves available to help patients hoping to find a bone marrow donor match. An estimated 750,000 Americans





live with leukemia, lymphoma, or myeloma, and a new patient is diagnosed with one of these cancers every five minutes. BAPS Charities regularly organizes Bone Marrow Drives to increase the chances of connecting a donor to a patient in need.

NEPAL EARTHQUAKE RELIEF

On 25 April 2015, a 7.8 magnitude earth-quake struck central Nepal, while a 6.7-magnitude tremor was felt less than 50 miles from the capital, Kathmandu, causing widespread devastation. Strong aftershocks continued to hit the region on 26 April. BAPS Charities responded to an urgent call for disaster relief aid by working with recognized organizations actively leading recovery efforts on the ground. BAPS Charities donated \$30,000 to Unicef, \$30,000 to World Food Program, \$25,000 to One Heart Worldwide, \$25,000 to Embassy of Nepal, and \$25,000 to Direct Relief.
